Grand Master's May Communique

My Brethren:

To lose ourselves in the service of something greater than we, as individuals are, is indeed a great honour. I am inspired by all that I see accomplished by you, year in and year out in the name of Brotherly love.

But your importance to our beloved Craft is not determined by brilliance near as much as your hard work, performed with likeminded individuals. Your Lodges and your Grand Lodge need your skills and talents to prosper and grow. Even if you feel you are nothing more than the 'average Hiram,' you are an important labourer in this great work. Without you, we are nothing. It is important to remember that history is made by the labours of those who seek to serve, not those who seek to drape themselves in glory. A few months ago, I used the baseball story of Coach Scolinos' plea not to 'widen the plate' and received a lot of positive comments regarding the message and even one who passed it on to his Son – thanks W. Bro. Cumming! And given that Major League

Baseball Opening Day has passed as you read this, I have another baseball analogy. It comes from a book I am currently reading called 'Teammate – My Journey in Baseball and a World Series for the Ages' written by David Ross with the assistance of Don Yaeger.

In 2016, the Chicago Cubs snapped their 108year 'curse' by capturing the World Series in an epic, historymaking, seven-game battle with the Cleveland Indians. Of the many storylines to Chicago's fairytale season, one stood out: the late career renaissance of David Ross. At thirty-nine years old, David had played thirteen of his fifteen year professional career as back-up catcher with the Los Angeles Dodgers, Pittsburgh Pirates, San Diego Padres, Cincinnati Reds, Boston Red Sox, Atlanta Braves and the Chicago Cubs.

I got to know David in August of 2008 after he was released by the Reds in the middle of a multiyear contract because he was considered to 'not be a good teammate.' That was the year my beloved Red Sox picked him up to add catching depth to a team on its way to its fifth postseason appearance in six years, including the 2004 World Series Champions after a 76-year drought and again in 2007. (Sorry, I had to get that in!) That was the year David turned his life around. There was no more being disgruntled for playing a diminished role on the field and no more being a headache for management. Over the next two months, despite being the new guy on the team, despite hardly playing, despite suffering through a tough season, David became a favourite among his teammates, found his way into the middle of the clubhouse dynamic and was even invited to advance scouting meetings as a third string catcher. A reformation if you will. He would still be in Boston when they won the World Series again in 2013 as back-up to a much younger catcher and as a leader in the club house.

The details of the book continue to say that beyond David's remarkable strong play, he became the ultimate positive force in the Cubs locker room, mentoring and motivating his fellow players, some of them nearly twenty years his junior. Thanks to his young teammates, Kris Bryant and Anthony Rizzo, "Grandpa Rossy" became a social media sensation. His last career at bat was a solo home run in game seven of the World Series and proved critical to the Cubs victory. At the end of the game, the capstone of a remarkable and resilient career, he was carried off the field on his teammates' shoulders.

My favourite line in the book is - "You don't have to be the Most Valuable Player on the team to be an invaluable player."

The next time you are called upon to do something that you feel is above your abilities, just remember that we are all part of the big picture, and we all have a part to play for us to be successful. Even your most seemingly insignificant efforts have far reaching consequences for good or evil. Therefore, we must choose our actions wisely for the benefit of those who will most assuredly follow in our footsteps.

Never forget that you and your fellow members are the future of Freemasonry in the Province of Ontario. Continue to persevere. Continue to serve. And above all else, continue to lead by example and push the great work of Ontario Freemasonry forward into the future!

In Memoriam Passing of a Grand Master

M.W. Bro. William 'Bill' R. Pellow passed to the GL Above on May 20, 2018. His mother lodge was Lorne Lodge No. 622 in his hometown of Chapleau ON (Algoma East District). His long and successful career as a dentist in London allowed him to affiliate with Ionic Lodge No. 716. He was predeceased by his wife Leitha (1931 – 2006), and son Robin (1967 – 1997). Since then his daughter Arden has died (2021). Interment of M.W. Bro. Pellow is in Chapleau Municipal Cemetery with his wife, where the monument marking his final resting place notes his role as Grand Master in 1987 – 1989, and other high ranks in concordant bodies.

In his autobiography he estimates he met over 100,000 people in his life and travels.

(1930-2018)

William Russel Pellow was born at Chapleau, Ontario, in 1930, and received his early education in local schools. He attended Albert College in Belleville and received a BA degree from Queen's University in 1960. He completed his studies at the University of Toronto School of Dentistry where he received a Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS) degree in 1964.

He spent 20 years with CPR (1942-63) becoming a locomotive engineer in 1953 on the White River-Chapleau-Cartier Sub-divisions. During the next decade

he was both a diesel-locomotive engineer and owner operator of a hunting and fishing business. In 1964 he moved to London where he practiced dentistry and branched into real estate, becoming President of Pellark Inc., a land and property development company. Dr.Pellow has also taught at the University of Toronto and UWO Dental Faculties. He is a member of local, provincial and federal dental societies and has held offices in a number of dental bodies.

He married Leitha Robinson in 1955 and they have two daughters, Kimberley Anne and Arden Linda, and one son, William Robin Jackson. The family are members of the United Church.

Masonic Career

Dr. William R. Pellow was initiated into Lorne 622 GRC, Chapleau (1956). His progression as a Lodge officer was interrupted by his education. After removing to London, he affiliated with Ionic 716, London (1966) and served as WM (1972). He was elected as DDGM of London East District (1976-77) and appointed (1980) to the Board of General Purposes and elected (1982-84) to the Board, serving on several committees including Masonic Education. He was elected as Deputy Grand Master 1985-86 and 1986-87 and Grand Master 1987-88 and 1988-89. He served as Chairman of the Commission of Recognition of the Grand Lodges of North America (1987-92). He holds honourary and affiliated membership in many Lodges. He is the recipient of Masonic honours from sister Grand Lodges, including: Henry Price Medal (Massachusetts), Pierpont Edwards Medal (Connecticut), Erasmus James Philips Medal (Nova Scotia), Jeremy L. Cross Award (New Hampshire) and is an Honourary Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan.

In the York Rite he is a member and Honourary Past First Principal of St. John's No. 3, London and Past Grand Sojourner of Grand Chapter. He is a recipient of the Order of the Purple Cross of the York Rite Sovereign College of North America (1990). He is a member of the Scottish Rite and was coroneted as an Honourary Inspector General 33E (1988).

He was a member of Rameses Shrine, Toronto (1961) and affiliated with Mocha Shrine, London (1966) where he served as Potentate (1968).

Article: Are you a Traveling Man?

I have learned a lot from traveling throughout the jurisdiction and beyond. I have found that there are differences between jurisdictions, districts, and even subtle differences from lodge to lodge. Those differences define who we are and should never be relegated to history. Maintain your lodge traditions, provided they do not conflict with Grand Lodge. Take as an example, in Humane Lodge 21 we not only use a Chamber of Reflection but celebrate it. An antiquated aspect of Freemasonry, Humane reinstated it, and have found it to add a new level of sublimity to the Entered Apprentice degree. It's different, while not changing or conflicting with Degree ritual, and gives the new initiate a unique perspective when they begin their Masonic journey.

Another benefit of traveling is the feeling of belonging. No matter what lodge I travel to, I am accepted as a friend and honored guest. I can vividly remember walking into Mt. Lebanon Lodge in Laconia, unknown to anybody, and being greeted as a lifelong friend. It was like I was a member of their lodge. "Grab a plate and have a seat, Brother." One of my homes away from home, Winnipesaukee Lodge No. 75 in Alton, is a great place to visit. They always have a program during the Stated Communication and a great meal. Federal Lodge No. 5 in Dover is another interesting place to visit. Their programs are generally more conversation than presentation. Sometimes starting as a book report and turning into a debate on the meaning of symbols in the lodge.

If you have been a Mason for 30 or 40 years you can probably open a lodge without thinking about it. You've seen the opening hundreds of times. As a newer Mason, if you don't travel, you can see the opening ten times a year. You can double that if you travel once a month. Go to one lodge a week and you'll see the opening forty or more times a year. After a few years, you won't have to study to open a lodge, you will already know how to. Sure, you'll probably want to study anyway, but you will have heard and seen it so many times that it will flow in your memory. You can then own the ritual, and not be robotic in the delivery. You'll be able to make it interesting and fresh for your membership.

You never know when you will run into a Brother. I was in Sloppy Joe's in Key West, enjoying an adult beverage when a gentleman asked me if I was a "Traveling Man". I said, "Sure, I just drove down from NH". He pointed at his ring and asked again "No, are you a Traveling Man?". The light bulb lit up bright and we had an hour-long masonic conversation in Key West.

Travel; you won't regret it.

Yes, I am a Traveling man.
