The brethren of Hugh Murray Lodge No.602, man the recovery station, every Wednesday from 3 – 7 PM at Canadian Blood Services in Ancaster. Canadian Blood Services is always look for donations. We have somehow gotten away from running blood drives, it would be nice to see that return.

This idea originated with PDDGM William Walter Paul during his term of office and I would like to see it continue. Deputy Grand Master's January Communique

Greetings Brethren,

With the Holiday season already behind us, I trust that all our Brethren have had the opportunity to share this special time with family, friends, and all those near and dear to each of us. As we settle into our new calendar year, let us begin with a positive outlook on all our Masonic endeavors. One area in particular which has currently resurfaced as a regular topic of discussion is that of solicitation, or more specifically, improper solicitation.

Issue No. 37 of our P&E Essentials, addresses the concept by outlining that "Our ritual is very clear that IMPROPER solicitation is to be avoided. Indeed, one of the first things that a new candidate must affirm on his initial entry into the Lodge is that he has not been biased by such action." Nonetheless, as our ritual is clear that we are to avoid improper solicitation, the specific reference to "Improper" does not imply to "any" solicitation in general. If the intent is for solicitation to be completely forbidden, the term would have been clarified as "No Solicitation".

When we talk about "improper" solicitation, we refer to actions that pressure or coerce individuals to seek membership against their own free will and accord. To better understand what we mean by improper solicitation, let's consider some examples as outlined in our P&E Essentials Issue 37. Actions such as bribing someone, tricking them, intimidation, coercion, bullying, extortion, or persistent harassment, or any other behavior along these lines are all considered improper ways to recruit new members. These actions not only undermine the very principles and values of our Craft, but they also damage the reputation and trust associated with our organization.

In contrast, there are many ways to genuinely and positively engage a potential candidate. Through our own observation, there may be men within our own personal and vocational circles, that may find Freemasonry a proper fit in their life journey. As many of us have found great personal growth, friendships, and a deeper understanding of life through our own membership, we have within ourselves the best testimonial for any man. The sharing of personal experiences, and the virtues of Freemasonry can definitely spark a genuine interest. When we talk about these benefits with enthusiasm and authenticity, we're not soliciting in a manipulative way, we're simply sharing a positive experience.

Furthermore, it's perfectly acceptable to express to someone that you think they would enjoy being a Mason, and to suggest if they would be interested in joining. This kind of invitation can be done respectfully without any pressure. It's important that we maintain the principle that individuals should seek membership of their own free will and accord. A conversation about Freemasonry should feel inviting rather than intimidating.


Let's talk about the practical steps we can take to enhance our outreach without crossing into improper solicitation. Many lodges engage in community activities such as Remembrance ceremonies, open house events, Blood donor clinics, and Masonichip programs. These are opportunities for individuals to see Freemasonry in action, which may foster curiosity and encourage questions. Participating in these activities not only serves our community, but also provides a natural context for conversations about our values and what being a Mason entails.

Another important tool is the use of well-maintained websites or literature that informs the public about who we are, what we do, and requirements to join. Explicitly stating that membership requires personal interest, and, that it is initiated by the individual's own decision, helps demystify the process and reduces misconceptions.

Lastly, our approach to proper solicitation is to ease any controversy over what is proper and improper. It does not however, herald a relaxed attitude towards our West Gate. In fact, this is an area where we must be more mindful and vigilant to ensure that we continue to attract potential candidates who will truly appreciate the principles and values of our Craft.



Founded in 1978, TEAD is a registered charity that provides therapeutic riding lessons and other equine programming to children and adults with physical, cognitive, and emotional disabilities. TEAD facilitates many different types of equine programming for all age levels and abilities.

They also offer a limited number of recreational lessons to independent walk/trot and wa;l/trot/canter riders only at this time. As it is a therapeutic riding centre first and foremost, the majority of their programming is dedicated to their therapeutic participants.

Therapeutic riding is an equine assisted activity for the purpose of contributing positively to the cognitive, physical, emotional, and social well-being of individuals with disabilities. Riding has many benefits including but not limited to:


- Development and improvement of balance & coordination
- Mobilization of trunk and pelvis
- Improvement of muscle tone & strength
- Prevention of contractures
- Increased confidence & self-esteem
- Promotion of independence
- Increased concentration, motivation & patience
- Improved learning skills
- Improvement of social integration
- Access to recreation, sport and/or competition
- A sense of control that might not otherwise be felt in everyday life

TEAD offers therapeutic riding lessons mornings, afternoons and evenings, 6 days a week, all year long. All of their instructors are nationally certified, and their horses have been chosen for their temperament and suitability to therapeutic work.
